Annotatsiya. Ushbu tadqiqot detektiv (mystery) janrida strukturaviy tartib va psixologik qo'rquv o'rtasidagi munosabatni o'rganadi hamda hikoya qurilishi va qahramonlar psixologiyasining o'quvchi qiziqishiga qanday ta'sir qilishini tahlil qiladi. Kirish qismida janrning asosiy paradoksi yoritiladi: u mantiqiy yechimni taklif etgan holda bir vaqtning o'zida qo'rquv va noaniqlikni yuzaga keltiradi.
